Vaughan Forklift License - Obtaining a forklift license or forklift certification within North America will require the trainee to do hands-on training in addition to classroom instruction. The provincial, federal and state regulatory bodies are responsible for the certification, training and licensing for powered industrial truck operators. Operators may obtain a license either through training administered by the employer or by a third party. In any case, regulatory requirements need to be met. Recertification is needed every two to three years.

The lift truck is a powered industrial machine that is designed with many options, like sit-down and stand-up models, propane and electric versions, and a wide variety of types and sizes to meet the industrial needs of workers. Operator training programs are usually individualized to be able address the particular uses and types for which the operator is training. Training on a gas-powered, sit-down forklift inside a warehouse surroundings will not be the same as training on a stand-up, propane-powered forklift within a shipyard. The variety of lift trucks and their applications makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all machinery and businesses. Regulatory standards, thus, have a tendency not to concentrate on particular course requirements but rather on the outcome of individual training programs.

Employer-provided, on-the-job training is the most common way for operators to acquire their forklift certification or license. This particular method of certification requires the employer to provide classroom sessions and practical training on machinery in the workplace. Employers may opt to train personnel on every kind of forklift separately, or to train them on all equipment combined. The program incorporates lift truck operation methods, safety measures, company policies and lift truck maintenance. Topics particular to the worksite, like dangerous conditions or materials, should be covered. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely operate and utilize each kind of lift truck on the worksite.

Certification through a third-party vendor generally requires an on-site component along with hands-on practice.

Usually, an employer-provided certification will not transfer from the existing employer to the next employer. Acquiring a forklift license through employer-provided training allows the operator to run a forklift for that specific employer only.

The most vital aspect of lift truck license training is forklift safety. The exact safety training requirements vary from one kind of machinery to another. Safety issues differ from industry to industry and from employer to employer. Both employer-provided training and third-party providers might have to address additional requirements for safety training in applicable businesses, like in offshore and marine uses.
